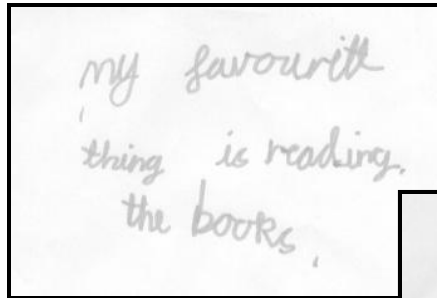
FUN AT BEAVERS

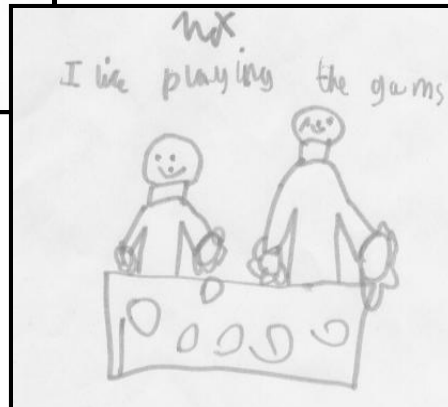

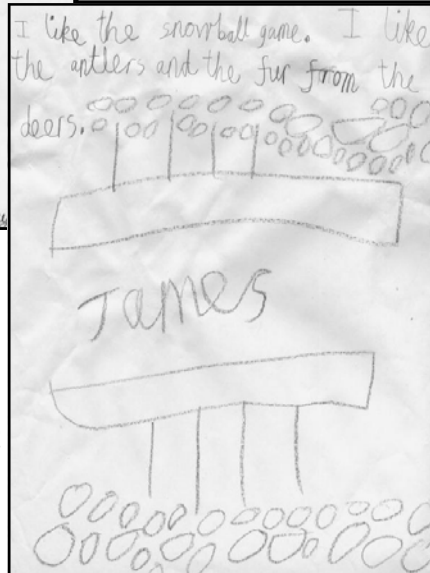

. . . First Aid Courses



Romsey District Scouts, in association with the British Red Cross, run a range of First Aid Courses for leaders and young people. The aim is to educate them in emergency procedures, so they know what to do in such a situation. We also offer training in Casualty Simulation and training to help young people become peer educators.

First Response (6 Hours)

Incident management, unconsciousness, CPR, bleeding, burns, fractures and medical conditions

No Certificate—attendance certificate only

Free to Hants Scouters. £12 to all others

Refresher available, if attended in previous 3 years by attending morning session until 1300, cost is £5.

Practical First Aid (14 Hours)

For outdoor activities suitable for BCU, WGL, ML etc

Incident management, Unconsciousness, CPR, major injuries, (bleeding & shock, burns, fractures—upper & lower spinal I jury and head injury), minor injuries and medical conditions.

Red Cross Certificate valid for 3 years

£40 (one day upgrade course)

Candidates need to have completed first response and been assessed on unconsciousness, CPR, bleeding and burns before attending the second day of this course.

Standard First Aid (28 Hours)

Covers most conditions listed in first aid manual.

Red Cross Certificate valid for 3 years

£70 (three day upgrade course)

Candidates need to have completed first response and been assessed on unconsciousness, CPR, bleeding and burns before attending the second day of this course.

Youth First Aid Module 2 (Residential weekend)

This is a weekend for Scouts to gain their **Emergency Aid (stage 5)**

Badge. The course is highly practical and includes casualty simulation, videos, interactive quizzes etc.

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HEAR ABOUT EVEREST

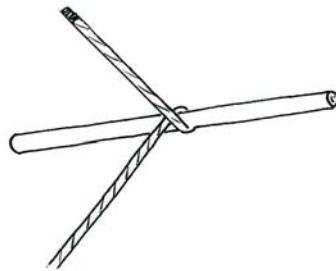
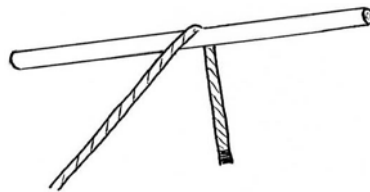

Knots & Lashings - An occasional series

The Clove Hitch

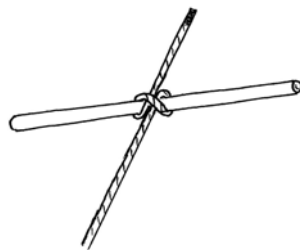
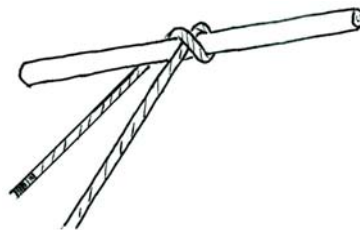
A hitch is a knot to attach a rope to a spar, and the clove hitch is one of the most common used for this purpose, although not necessarily the best. It is easy to tie and can even be done one-handed (a challenge for you to try). It is best used in the middle of a rope so that both ends are under tension, and if used at the end of a rope it is wise to leave a long end to guard against it coming undone.

Start by holding the standing part in your left hand and placing a long end over the spar to which the knot is to be attached.



Drop the end over the spar and reach under with your right hand to bring the end back up and over the spar again. As you cross the spar again, also cross to the left going over the first turn. ◀

Move the standing part to your right hand. Now reach under with your left hand and bring the end back up. ▶



Pass the end under the crossed over turn. Move the parts of the hitch up close together because part of its strength comes from friction between the turns. Now pull tight. ◀

Many people get this hitch wrong because they do not change hands in the middle. It is important that the end starts off on the right of the standing part and after the first turn is on the left of the standing part. Changing hands forces you to do it right.

If you are left-handed you can change all the instructions round.

This hitch is also commonly used as the start of many lashings.

I felt that not too many members may know John Stevens very well and thought it might be helpful to us all if we knew a bit about him—he'll have to work at getting to know us, as there's no quick answer to that.

John's Bit:

Greetings; as some of you will know I have recently taken over from David Sutton as District Chairman on a temporary basis.

As someone from Southampton and latterly with strong connections to the Rownhams and Nursling Group, most of you in the District have probably never heard of me.

So by way of introduction I thought I would share a short autobiography with you.

I was born in Southampton on the day the Korean War ended. At the age of seven I was the first member of my family to join the Scout movement when I became a cub. My pack was the 10th Southampton (Avenue), which sadly no longer exists; I was in tawny six and my Akela was Betty Morris. I wasn't an outstanding Cub; I still can't do a somersault and I only got three proficiency badges. If she is still alive I think Betty would be astonished to discover that I was acting District Chairman.

When I went up to Scouts, my first Scoutmaster was Mr Gailbrath, a dour Scots Bank Manager who always wore a kilt. My next Leader was Dave Marks who was a major influence in my development. Leaders should never underestimate the impact they can have on the members of their section. Dave organised a summer camp at Buckfast in 1966, for five of the ten days it rained solidly but I grew up during that camp and came home a completely different person. When I talk about character building it's not just a cliché, I have experienced it and benefited from it.

I left the Group as a Troop Leader, I started to go to the new "Mark 5" Venture Unit but they seemed more interested in girls and home-made beer, so I didn't stay. I was a bit naive in those days!

Work, marriage, four years in Southend and children meant I had little contact with Scouting in the 70's and 80's. My father had been secretary at the 10th Avenue and my brother held various leader posts

in **Southampton**, mainly with the Cubs. Peter was also great collector of badges and scouting memorabilia, sadly Peter and my father are no longer with us.

In the late 80's I became a school governor at Aldermoor and later Chairman of Governors at Fairisle first school. At about the same time Paul, my eldest, became a Beaver, Cub and later Scout at the 18th Maybush. Karen was a Rainbow and Brownie in Maybush and Lordshill.

Later Paul moved to the 21st Rownhams and Nursling and Karen joined him when she left Brownies. It was there that I started on the slippery slope towards where I am now. It started with helping Peter Digby with wide games and then more regular help with Derek Smith. This lead to me being parent rep on the exec and then on to Chairman of the fundraising team and then, when David Newbit stood down, 5 years as Chairman of the Group Executive Committee.

Just as I started as Chairman one of our Cub Leaders went sick and never returned, so I and Karen spent the rest of the year helping Tony Moles and co run the pack. Karen stayed on and became an Assistant Cub Leader, I would also help at Cub Camp and it appears to have been my reappearance, after a brief sabbatical, at Hants 007 that put me in the frame for my current position.

I have lived in Maybush since 1983 with my wife Jenny, Paul and Karen, 2 cats, 2 guinea pigs and a rabbit. I used to rehabilitate hedgehogs but building work, in preparation for retirement, has meant we no longer have room for them.

If I were to have a family crest my motto would be "audire et grates", which should mean "I listen and I thank". I hope to visit every Group in the District within the next few months, so please let me know when your next Exec or Management Meetings are.
