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Queen's Scouts Parade, Windsor

on us in 1934 by King George V and has been continued ever since.

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and Romsey was extremely fortunate this year to have four new award holders present on this special day. Jean Beauchamp, Janice Waterman and Bob Garlike were joined by Vice President David Sutton at this spectacular event.

The day dawned bright and clear and remained that way throughout the day. Entry to the Castle involved an airport style security screening which is now a familiar part of all our lives. Award holders were invited to join the Chief Scout, Peter Duncan, at morning service in St George's Chapel. Sitting in the magnificent nave which has barely changed in 500 years is a memorable experience in itself and to see a congregation in such a place dominated by scout uniforms is truly moving. The congregation all stood for the entrance of the Military Knights of Windsor followed by the clergy. The service was accompanied by the acclaimed choir of St George's Chapel who are renowned for the quality of their singing.

The sermon was by the Reverend Canon Dr Heuston Finlay who took as his theme the parable of Lazarus and the rich man. He worked round to the point that the rich man had not listened to the teachings of the prophets on how to lead a goodly life and the message for others was 'Be Prepared'.

In the afternoon we entered the great quadrangle of the castle through St George's Gate to see the magnificent lawn surrounded by the imposing tower and ancient stonework of the castle walls. After a short wait in the sunshine the band of the Coldstream Guards marched in and took up position on the lawn. The parade of Queen's Scouts followed to line up along either side of the lawn in double rows. They were followed by an excellent band from 17th Tonbridge Scout and Guide Band augmented by the Corps of Drums from the 3rd

Davyhulme Scout and Guide Band. Finally the colour party with the King's Flag (presented by George V), the Flag of St George, and the Scout Association Colour took up position in the centre of the lawn.

Major General Sir Michael Hobbs KCVO CBE, Governor of the Military Knights of Windsor, representing the Queen then entered the quadrangle. Accompanied by the Chief Scout he proceeded around the lawn to inspect all the Queen's Scouts, while the Coldstream Guards and the Scout Band alternated in providing a musical accompaniment. Finally Major General Hobbs took the salute on the dais with the Chief Scout as all the company marched past. The parade left the quadrangle again through St George's Gate to make their way to St Georges Chapel for the National Scout Service which all new Queen's Scouts may attend.

A tremendous honour and a truly memorable day.

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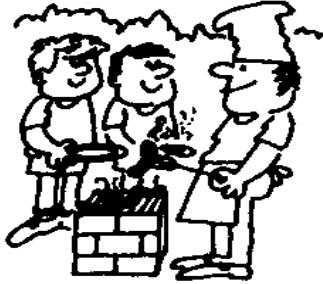
**CUB SIXERS DAY**

After the threat of inclement weather, the annual Sixers Day turned out to be just right for all the activities planned for the day – sunny but very windy.



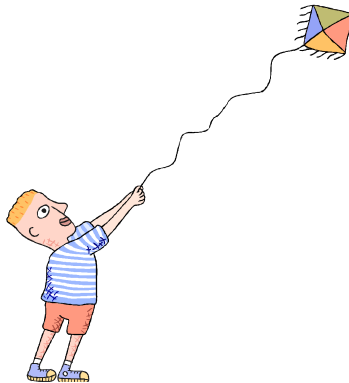

The six month position was the first prize in a competition launched by Tourism Queensland in January. Ben's new job will require him to live and report from Hamilton Island on Queensland's Great Barrier Reef.

The 16 finalists were invited to Hamilton Island to spend 4 days going through a selection process involving snorkelling, barbecues and time at a spa. They also had to display their writing abilities, take part in a swimming test and sit through an interview. Ben said he felt it was a great honour to be

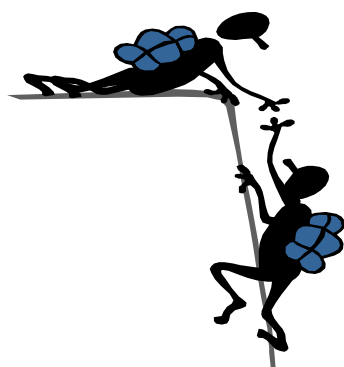

BEAR GRYLLS—OUR NEW CHIEF SCOUT

Bear Grylls will be the new Chief Scout of the UK Scout Association. The famous adventurer takes over when the current Chief Scout, former Blue Peter presenter, completes his five year tenure in July.

When asked why he chose to volunteer for the UK's largest mixed youth movement, Bear said: "In short, because I love adventure and I love hanging out with good friends. For me this is what Scouting is about".

He first got involved in Scouting aged eight as a Cub Scout. Bear attributes this time as part of the inspiration behind his adult adventures, presenting TV shows such as Born Survivor: "So much of who we are as an adult is formed when we are kids", said Bear. "What Scouting says to people is: "it's okay to go for it in life".

"Every child has a right to have an adventure. Life is about grabbing opportunities. The prizes don't always go to the biggest, the best, the strongest—they go to those who persevere. These are the simple life lesson that Scouting teaches people".

The Chief Scout provides inspiration for the 100,000 volunteers involved in Scouting across the UK.

Working in partnership with Bear will be Scouting volunteer Wayne Bulpitt, who takes on the new role of UK Chief Commissioner. Wayne will focus on providing leadership to all volunteers within scouting. Like Bear, Wayne's Scouting began when he joined as a Cub Scout.
