## **SUPPORTERS' CLUB SMALL GRANTS FUND**

The District raises money by way of the Supporters' Club and it was decided two years ago that some of that money raised should be available to Groups for any project they would like to receive financial assistance for. A condition of the grant would be that those in receipt of it would publicise the support received.

This fund is held by the District Treasurer for use by any Group for any project, they would like financial assistance with. There is no means testing of the 'applicant,' which means any group can apply. We ask that you at least match the amount you are requesting, we don't need a lengthy submission (a maximum of one side of A4) and any project will be considered.

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## **DUDLEY DAINTON FUND**

### **HERE'S A USEFUL GADGET.....**

I like gadgets, don't get me wrong if it's the latest "must have" or "be the first kid on your block to ..." or "be the envy of your friend"; I don't want to know. To me a gadget is something that makes things easier or saves me time but I have to be completely convinced before I put my hand in my pocket. I'm not an impulse buyer when it comes to gadgets, so if it's a great new tool or new piece of software you won't find me in the queue to buy the latest release. It actually was a whole year before I finally decided to buy the laptop computer I'm writing this piece on.

Once I have purchased my gadget, I won't be without my mobile phone, the GPS for my car, this laptop and my cordless drill. My cordless drill, which uses battery technology developed for lunar exploration, is easy to use and allows me to do those little jobs quickly and easily; if I remember to recharge the battery!

We have gadgets in Scouts but they are not as high tech or need recharging like the gadgets I use. Scout gadgets are as old as Scouting itself and probably had their origins in the field kitchens that Baden Powell knew so well in his army days. Gadgets are devices or pieces of kitchen furniture that make the camp kitchen easier, safer and healthier to work in. They were a regular feature of camps until the mid 60's, when camps were for several weeks and there weren't the range of exciting activities we have today. We still use gadgets at camp and they are an essential part of Pulborough and Emlyn camping competitions; worth 50 marks.

Why do we still include gadgets in the marking system for a competition camp? Constructing a gadget requires research, planning, pioneering skills and team work; all skills essential for good, safe and healthy camping. It is apparent in recent years that several Pulborough patrols have not put sufficient thought or effort into their gadgets. With a little imagination and application these are 50 easy marks.

Yes there is the usual crop of an impractical dresser, a single wash stand and something to keep your boots dry on but that's about it. There is plenty of information out there, most Groups have dusty corners where earlier editions of "Scouting for Boys" or some of the camping guides or pioneering booklets that were so popular in the '60's. These are a treasure trove of ideas for different gadgets. Some Groups are lucky enough to have handbooks from other Countries, the Americans, Australians and Canadians are into Scouting and camping in a big way and their handbooks, publications and websites have

ideas for gadgets not even seen in this country. I know that in this year's Emlyn final, one patrol made a gadget they found in an Australian Scout handbook and was new to most of the patrols taking part.

So you've done your research and selected about 10 gadgets to use in your camp kitchen, what do you do next? Draw a scale plan and check that they'll all fit in to your allocated space. Try building a scale model of each gadget using dowel or canes and twine. First try a model of 10<sup>th</sup> full size i.e. 1cm on the model equals 10cm in real life, see how it works, does it stand up, was it easy to make and what and how much wood and rope do you need to build for real? Then, if you've been bitten by the modelling bug, try making a model of your entire camp site. For this model you might try using 30<sup>th</sup> scale i.e. 1cm to 30cm. This is not too far from the 32<sup>nd</sup> Scale used for readymade model farms and soldiers, so if you have some of these figures you could use them to give realism to your model.

So good hunting, good modelling and good luck!
